1. CALL TO ORDER

Council President Linehan called the meeting to order at 7:06 PM.

2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE & MOMENT OF SILENCE IN HONOR OF SERVICE MEMBERS

4. GUESTS, CITIZEN ACHIEVEMENT, AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

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Cemetery Superintendent and Tree Warden Chris Rosa will appear before the Council with a status update on recent projects as well as the new Tree Steward Program that will soon be rolled out for residents citywide.

Superintendent Rosa passed out samples of two books he has written entitled 'Tree List and Planting Guidelines' and 'Beneath the Canopy' as well as new t-shirts to mark the volunteers who will be serving as part of the Tree Steward Program. This program will utilize residents to help maintain new trees throughout the city.

Mr. Rosa also announced Forest Dale Cemetery has been upgraded to a level two arboretum. Additionally, the cemetery boasts the first permeable pavement road in Malden. A long term goal would be to see these pavers on roads citywide.

Fellsmere Pond has recently been certified as an official wildlife habitat. A second pocket forest is in the works for Ward 8. The process for this forest is not anticipated to run as smoothly as the pocket forest in Ward 5 because the Ward 8 land is owned by the State; the project is in negotiation. Currently, Malden has approximately 16% canopy coverage; Mr. Rosa's goal is to eventually reach 40% tree coverage.

Residents who are interested in getting a tree planted in their yard may visit MassUrbanCanopy.org to obtain more information and apply.

Final Paper 342-25 Home Rule Petition Max Age Limit for Special

Police Officers

Police Chief Glenn Cronin was in attendance to introduce this paper. Since 2018, retired police officers are permitted to perform details in Malden under the provisions as special municipal officers but the age was capped at 65 years old. This petition seeks to increase that age to 70. The demand for details has increased but the pool of available candidates is shrinking; if passed this home rule petition will increase the pool of special officers available to work details.

Chief Cronin spoke of the benefits of having trained officers performing detail work. It will increase police presence across the city with no additional investment. Special municipal officers are responsible for providing their own equipment and uniforms. Training is provided at no cost through the state. Two trainings annually with proven qualification and a yearly medical examination are part of the criteria every special officer must adhere to. Additionally, as these officers are retired police their medical costs are covered by the state. The city is protected from any financial obligation if a special officer is injured on a detail.

A motion was made by Councillor Sica, seconded by Councillor Winslow, that the Order be adopted. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

343-25 Order: That the City Council develop a home rule petition to be submitted to the

Massachusetts Legislature that would provide the City the right to adopt rules for

the regulation of parking on private ways within the City.

Councillor Winslow is seeking to have this paper go through the Rules and Ordinance Committee to prepare the language for the purpose of regulation and enforcement of parking on private ways as opposed to having the burden fall only to the residents who live on the street. Representatives from the Legal Department will also be asked to attend that meeting for their opinion as to whether this will be beneficial to the city.

A motion was made by Councillor Winslow, seconded by Councillor Spadafora, that the Order be referred to the Rules & Ordinance Committee. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Final Paper 344-25 Hospital Road Reconfiguration

Council President Linehan was clear to point out that the portion of Hospital Road discussed in this paper is not the same portion of street as addressed by Lauren McGillicuddy in her public comment. Ms. McGillicuddy's concern focused on an evergreen tree at the corner of Murray Hill and Hospital Road that was taken down erroneously and unannounced to the neighborhood. Paper 344-25 is regarding the Savin Street end of Hospital Road. The purpose of this paper is to comply with special permit #23-10 guidelines for the narrowing of the roadway and widening of the sidewalk.

Councillor Winslow expressed concern for utilizing the process of confirmatory taking to be sure there is a defined plan with consensual agreement and to be clear there will be no cost to the city in the process. His recommendation in referring this to the DPW Commission is to ask they not put the city at risk of financial loss or disputes either now or in the future.

Councillor McDonald suggested simply clarifying the order to state it does not apply to the intersection of Murray Hill and Hospital Road and add a requirement that the Legal Department review the order before final approval by the DPW Commission. A motion was made to incorporate those amendments.

A motion was made by Councillor McDonald, seconded by Councillor Winslow, that the Order be amended. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

A motion was made by Councillor Spadafora, seconded by Councillor Simonelli, that the Order be adopted as amended. The motion carried by a 10-1 voice vote. Councillor O'Malley dissenting.

This paper serves as an administrative amendment to the Council Rule book to allow residents wishing to speak during public comment to identify themselves by their street name and city if they are uncomfortable with stating their entire address on the record. The desire for this change was initiated by members of the public who have recently expressed concern for safety in this age of doxing and cyber bullying over differences of political positions.

A motion was made by Councillor Colon Hayes, seconded by Councillor O'Malley, that the Order be adopted. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

10. EXECUTIVE SESSION

347-25

Order: The City Council will vote whether to go into Executive Session with legal counsel in accordance with Exemption Three, Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 30A, §21(a)(3) to discuss strategy with respect to the Opioid Litigation, where such discussion in open meeting would have a detrimental effect on the litigation position of the City, if so declared by the Chair. Also, if allowed by the Body, to admit Special Assistant to the Mayor Maria Luise and Controller Charles Ranaghan.

A motion was made by Councillor Simonelli, seconded by Councillor O'Malley, to recuse Councillor Simonelli from this conversation. Motion passed by unanimous vote.

Council President Linehan stated that since the posting of this agenda, she is no longer of the opinion that discussing this issue in open session would have a detrimental effect on the City's litigating position. She stated most of what is expected to be discussed is already in the public domain and the City of Malden is not a direct party in the ongoing litigation. With this declaration, MGL 30A, s. 21(a)(3) is no longer a valid exception to enter Executive Session. The body agreed to discuss the paper in open session.

Council President Linehan vacated the chair in order to discuss this paper; Councillor McDonald took over the meeting for the purpose of 347-25.

A motion was made by Councillor Linehan, seconded by Councillor Winslow, that the topic be discussed in open session. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

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This paper is regarding the Purdue Pharma and Sackler Family bankruptcy cases.

The recommendation from the Attorney General is for Massachusetts' municipalities to opt in to this settlement agreement but in doing so, the municipality must agree to release the Sackler Family from future litigation. Opting into the settlement would guarantee Malden a certain amount of money to be used on opioid abatement and remediation services. The alternative to opting in would be to forgo any settlement funds and then having to make the decision to sue Purdue and/or Sackler's independent of the State of Massachusetts. The more municipalities in MA that accept the bankruptcy plan and release the Sacklers the more money that will be payable to the state.

The maximum that is likely to be paid out may be \$6.5 bil from the Sacklers with another \$1.5 bil from Purdue to be divided between the states. Whatever portion that comes to Massachusetts, 60% will go directly to the state and 40% will be distributed between all local municipalities. The payout will be distributed over a ten-year period.

Council action must be submitted by September 14, 2025 to be included in the master ballot. Two different votes are recommended, one to accept the Purdue bankruptcy plan and the second to release the Sacklers from future lawsuits.

Councillor O'Malley expressed concern with releasing the Sackler family from liability without doing proper due diligence. He is not prepared to vote on this paper this evening and is looking forward to hearing the AG's meeting scheduled for September 4 that will be discussing this exact topic.

The consensus of the Council is that, although upsetting there isn't more morally that can be done in this situation, more good may be done with the settlement funds than if Malden opted out of the plan and had to pursue their own litigation. To do so, the city would require outside counsel. The City Solicitor and lawyers from several other firms who have been following this case from the beginning are comfortable with this plan. Attorney Generals from all fifty states have recommended participation.
