

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

This is the 11th Annual Report of this President and the 139th Annual Report of the Malden Public Library as mandated by a Special Act of the State Legislature.

'Without a struggle, there is no progress.' How true those words of Frederic Douglass ring, especially this past year.

After a year and more of storm related repairs and then getting back on track with delayed projects, 2016-2017 started off with great hopes and aspirations to forge ahead. Deferred projects and ideas could finally be implemented. However, amid these hopes, we bore the sadness of the loss of two Trustees - George Holland, a trustee since 1985 and still active on the Board and Wilfred Carr, an honorary Trustee who served on the Board for 15 years before retiring in 1985. Both served in leading roles during crucial times for the Library.

It was a good year for the Library. Improvements in the building, collections and technology progressed. The long-awaited improvements in security and lighting became a reality. New lighting was installed in all the Art Galleries – Ryder, Carr, Lower and the Statuary Alcove. Security cameras were installed throughout the Converse Building. The Fireplace Reading Room was restored and carpeting was replaced in the Ryder Gallery. The public restrooms were studied for possible replacement. More computers were made available to the public and a new microfilm reader capable of digitization of data was given to the Library by the Piccolo Family Charitable Foundation. A more in-depth inventory of all the art works was undertaken. An inventory of all prints was slowly begun and some pleasant surprises occurred – old Japanese woodblock prints, old master prints as well as a large number of Turner and Claude Lorraine works were found along with posters and other engravings. This will certainly be a long-term project.

Much of the City Archives were brought to the Library for storage in preparation for the demolition of the Government Center. The Library also became the repository for the files of the *Malden Evening News* after the sale of its building.

A number of events brought varied audiences to the Library- Malden Reads events, an Exhibit on Pearl Harbor by John Webster, ongoing children and adult programs. The most popular event was the presentation by the Librarian of Congress Carla Hayden to over 250 librarians and others. Sen. Edward Markey also spoke.

John Moreschi was selected as the new Trustee to succeed Dr. Holland. He was soon appointed to head a Long Range Committee for the Board. The staff and administration continue to do yeoman's service in spite of the problems that frequently plague the Library. In spite of it all, we are happy to say that this year Marjorie Glennon has celebrated 45 years of service to the Library.

We thank all our patrons who give us the reason to exist, our donors whose funding helps us to carry on, especially the Bayrd Foundation, Preotle, Lane & Associates and Eastern Bank. We appreciate the cooperation and joint activities with the Malden Historical Society. We appreciate the support of the Mayor and City Council and their pride in our spot in the Cityscape. It has led to great successes for the Library and the City.

We hope and plan to continue providing the best service, the best extracurricular educational venue.

Although, there are always struggles and movement may be slow we are making progress.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

This is the 5th report of the Librarian and the 139th submitted to the Board of Trustees.

On Saturday, March 18, the Malden Public Library was honored to host a very special reception with United States Librarian of Congress Dr. Carla Hayden and United States Senator Edward Markey. Dr. Hayden picked Malden to make her first-ever visit to



Massachusetts. Dr. Hayden and Senator Markey led a discussion for over 200 librarians and guests on education, the role of libraries in communities, and the importance of library funding to ensure access to all. Senator Markey warmly recalled his countless hours studying at the Malden Public Library as a college and law school student.






As part of her visit, Dr. Hayden toured the library, including spending time in the old closed stacks: yes Dr. Hayden loves old stacks! It was there that Dr. Hayden, Senator Markey, and about 10 huddled guests explored the amazing connection between Malden and the Library of Congress.

It all began under the director of Malden's first female director. Miss Lizzie A. Williams. Serving from 1891 to 1912, Williams' accomplishments were many, including advocating for a children's department at the time when children under twelve were denied all library privileges. In 1897, a building addition was added that included a four-story stack room. Amazingly, this stack room was copied from the stack of the Library of Congress – one that was recently designed and installed by Malden born civil engineer Bernard Green. In 1897, Green was appointed Superintendent of Buildings at the Library of Congress (he also worked on the Washington Monument). It was in those same stacks, the steel and aging paper, we all thought of amazing connections that brought one Malden man to the Library of Congress; and the Librarian of Congress back to his home-town.







The smell of fresh paint and new carpeting is lingering in the air, offering a hint of all the building work that has taken place this year. Thanks to continued support from the Adelaide Breed Bayrd Foundation, we completed many important projects, including masonry repair and repointing on the Park Street side of the building, masonry repair on the Salem Street portico, repainting of Salem Street historic windows, restoring interior woodwork and ceilings in the fireplace room, fixing the Ryder Gallery atrium/dome, and installing a new working electric fireplace in the Converse Reading Room.

In March, the Board of Trustees rededicated the Reading Room to Florence Burns, the first woman elected to the Board of Trustees in 1973 and Board of Trustee President from 1984 to 1997. Florence was a fierce advocate for the Malden Public Library and instrumental in the completion of the 1996 addition to the building.





The Florence Burns Reading Room received a further upgrade through a grant from the Piccolo Family Charitable Foundation for the purchase of a new Scanpro microfilm reader and digital scanner. The scanner will help researchers better access our historic newspaper collection.



This year, the largest project completed was the re-lighting of the Converse Memorial Building Art Galleries, a project that took many years from planning to realization. The project included removing much of the art from the galleries, replacing fluorescent tube lighting with museum-quality LED fixtures, repainting ceilings, installing a surveillance system, repairing the Ryder gallery atrium, and re-carpeting the Ryder Gallery. The project was funding by the Adelaide Breed Bayrd Foundation and made possible by the work of Stirling/Brown Architects, Murray Brothers Construction and Nardone Electric.













This year we were also busy hosting special events in the Converse Memorial Building: the Malden Historical Society installed a Malden Uniform Exhibition, the Mayor hosted Malden Declaration Day and a special exhibition "Talking about A Revolution" on the founding



era. We hosted a wedding, a bridal shower, and the Junior Aide Presidents' Brunch. The Library was also honored to host the memorial reception for former Trustee Wilfred Carr and funeral services for former staff member Librarian Kenneth Pease.

With funding from the Malden Historical Society, we digitized early town records dating from 1682. We also inventoried and stored town documents and artifacts from the former City Hall Archives, and moved archive records of the Malden Evening News to the library, after the newspaper's sudden closing.

We added to the Converse Art Gallery collections with the purchase of four abstracts by Malden-born artist Panos Ghikas and 1894 watercolor by Ludvig Sandöe Ipsen (1840-1920), father of the artist Ernest Ipsen.

In May, I was honored to receive the Historical Society's *Deloraine P. Corey Award* for assisting in Society's efforts to preserve Malden's rich history.

My continued thanks to the entire staff, the Board of Trustees, Mayor Gary Christenson, and all city officials, our generous donors and volunteers, and to the wonderful community of Malden whose support of their library makes all things possible.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MALDEN PUBLIC LIBRAY JULY 2016 – JUNE 2017

STAFF CHANGES

On October 4, the Malden Public Library community mourned the passing of Librarian Kenneth Pease, at the age of 81. Ken attended Iowa State University, University of Dubuque, Princeton, Harvard University, and Boston University. Before retiring in 2016, Ken spent the last 21 years of his career working at our Library. Ken had a deep knowledge of Malden history, a



love of the Converse Memorial Building and its art collection, and a true devotion to serving the information needs of Malden residents. He was a consummate gentleman and a mentor to many of the staff currently working at the library; and will be missed by all.

The Library also said goodbye to longtime Information and Local History Librarian Stephen Nedell. Stephen has taken a position as the travelling K-8 Librarian for the Malden Public Schools. Librarians Jennifer Browning and Lily Mysona were promoted to full-



time Information Librarian positions. Derek Diggs was promoted from a part-time to full-time position serving in the Circulation and Technical Service Departments, and Thuy-Tam Vo, a former summer volunteer, started as a page in early November.



In March, Mayor Christenson stopped by to congratulate Marge Glennon on her 45 years of outstanding service to the Library. Marge began working as a student messenger in 1972. She became a full-time employee in 1978 and is the only current staff member to work under former Directors Irving Cole and Dina Malgeri.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT LIBRARIAN

Technology

The Malden Public Library focused much of FY17 to upgrading the technology offerings for the public. Early in the year, new computers were installed in both the Children's Room and the Young Adult room, expanding the number of YA computers from 2 to 4. New software was installed in the YA room, including video and audio editing programs, and cameras and microphones to use with those programs.



The need to upgrade the public wifi was the most pressing technology issue entering FY17. The decision to purchase and install Meraki switches, with the help of Syndeo Technologies allowed wifi extender spots be located throughout the library, increasing the range and strength of the public wifi. The number of devices connecting to our wifi continues to increase and the upgrade has allowed all users fast and reliable access.

Malden Reads

A *Man Called Ove* by Fredrik Backman was the 2017 choice for Malden Reads. This is the story of a man, after the death of his wife and loss of his job, decides there is nothing left to live for. With the (often unwanted) help of neighbors and town folk, Ove finds the family and community that makes his life worth living again. The themes of the book were expanded upon in numerous programs held throughout Spring season, including a presentation to the Malden City Council.





Friends of the Malden Public Library

The Friends of the Malden Public Library held their annual Book Sale at the end of October 2016 and it was another successful event. The "Friends Only" Preview Night on Friday gave Friends members the opportunity to shop early, and the 10-4 Saturday hours found hundreds of people leaving with bags of books and big smiles. Because the book sale is always popular with the public, a "mini sale" was held in mid-December from 4-8 on a Wednesday evening, hoping to encourage people to shop for holiday items from the Friends. Again, it was well-attended and another "mini-sale" will be held in the Spring of 2018.

The 15th Annual Friends of the Malden Public Library Wine Tasting and Chocolate Bar was held on Friday, April 28, 2017 in the Library's Converse Building and Galleries and it was another sold-out event. The Friends procured donations of food, raffle items, money, and gift certificates to ensure a successful event. Among the most popular raffle items was Café Bibliotecha, a multi-course Italian dinner cooked and served by Joe Cesario and John Tramondozzi – and served under the beautiful Converse portico.

The Friends continued to sponsor many, many programs at the Library, and purchase items that enhance the Library experience for Malden patrons, including discount museum passes, new YA furniture and computers, Summer Reading programs, and the list goes on and on. The Library recognizes and appreciates the hard work the Friends volunteers do every day.

Led by Committee Chair Ellie Cushing, the Library held its 19th Annual Triple Threat Trivia Fundraiser on January 26 at Anthony's Function Hall. Master of Ceremonies Paul Solano kept the evening lively and fun and Team Hill-Iovino took home the well-earned winner's cup. Thank you to

LIVE ON THE LAWN SUMMER CONCERT SERIES

The Library held its 3rd Annual Live on the Lawn Summer Concert Series thanks to our continued sponsorship by the Eastern Bank Charitable Foundation. This year's concerts featured the sounds of *O'Boogie and the Fireman, Horizon and the Horns,* featuring Malden's own Ray Novak, and the *Ricardo Monzon Jazz Quartet*. In August, the series ended with the showing of *Zootopia* at the Live on the Lawn Family Movie Night.









ADULT SERVICES

Malden residents continue to use their library enthusiastically. In fiscal 2017, we circulated 361,629 items to library card holders and 46,267 items to other libraries throughout the state. Library staff answered 89,952 reference questions and assisted an average of 700 Internet and wifi users per week. The library offered 303 programs throughout the year, attended by 16,943 children, teen, and adults.

Adults attended many programs at the library, including weekly ESOL conversation classes, book discussion groups, origami workshops, movie and board game nights, adult color class, and knitting for a cause.











CHILDRENS SERVICES

In March, Malden welcomed Dr. Carla Hayden and Senator Edward Markey for a special family story time. Senator Markey read *House Mouse, Senate Mouse,* and Dr. Hayden read *It's a Book* and *One Word from Sophia*. The two guests were a great team and marvelously entertaining. Dr. Hayden invited Children's Librarian Rebecca Smith on stage, and the program finished with a joyous round of "If You're Happy and You Know It."




In August, the Children's Department welcomed a visit from Bruins Mascot Blades. Mayor Christenson, Children's Librarian Rebecca Smith and Malden High School's Mascot Nedlam were on hand to welcome the Bruins to Malden. Blades was travelling across the state to encourage kids and teens to keep reading over the summer and avoid the "summer slide" and maintain skills learned over the academic year.





In October, the staff welcomed a visit from author Lesa Cline-Ransome. Lesa stopped by to let the staff know that the library was mentioned in the dedication of her new juvenile book, *Set Me Free*, a book about the childhood of Frederick Douglass.

Despite some staffing shortages during the year, children and their families enjoyed weekly song and rhyme story times and Saturday kids crafts, story times with Mayor Christenson, a visit by



Chinese sugar artists, and a workshop on paper circuits and light up shoes, funded by the Malden Cultural Council.









SUMMER READING PROGRAM 2017

The theme of the 2017's Summer Reading Program was "Building a Better World." Summer Reading Programs are not only fun but beneficial, with studies showing that students who participate in public library summer reading programs scored higher on reading achievement tests at the beginning of the next school year than those who did not, avoiding the so called "Summer slide."

Summer at the Library can also be a lot of fun. The 2017 Summer Reading Program kicked off with an Ice Cream Social and Lawn Party sponsored by Dairy Delight. Thanks to the continued support of Preotle, Lane and Associates, children and teens had a full summer of great programming. Children were treated to performances by Todd Brodeur's Frisbee Show and Play Shop, Museum of Science: Reptiles, Kidstock: Max and the Suzy in Goldiloch Ness Monster, a Hula Hoop Workshop with Pinto Bello Hoops, and Pumpernickel Puppets presented The Frog Prince and Three Bill Goats Gruff. Local yoga instructor Becky Small taught free yoga classes for children, teens and adults; and the Museum of Fine Art returned with Art Adventures for kids, ages 3-6 and 6-10. The Children's Department offered 32 summer programs with 2,179 attendees.



YOUNG ADULT DEPARTMENT


During Summer Reading 2017, the Young Adult Department offered jewelry making, anime and gaming events, and young adult movie afternoons, teen yoga, and a workshop of designing, decorating and growing herb planters. Teens also got creative at a perler bead workshop, LEGO robotics with the YMCA, and Minecraft. Teens who read at least 5 hours a week were eligible for weekly prizes and a prize was presented to the teen who read the most.











CIRCULATION, TECHNICAL PROCESSING & CATALOGING

The Technical Services, Circulation, and Catalog Departments kept items flowing onto the library shelves all year long. This year the staff dealt with a major upgrade to Polaris, the integrated library computer and circulation system. A new committee was established to review policies and update procedures and to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees. Homebound deliveries continued despite staff shortages. The Chinese collection was re-organized and relabeled and more room was created for the growing World Language collection. Library card applications and instructions were translated into many languages. The staff also continued weeding the fiction and nonfiction collections.

WORLD LANGUAGE COLLECTION & ENGLISH AS SECOND LANGUAGE CLASSES

The World Languages collection continued to expand to include languages such as Chinese, Arabic, French, Spanish, Haitian-Creole, Vietnamese, Hindi, Portuguese, and this year Tigrinya, the language of Eritria. The Library continues to provide weekly English Conversation class to people from about 49 different countries, including Haiti, China, India, Poland, Morocco, Belgium, El Salvador, Iran, Peru, Congo, Brazil, Syria, Mongolia, Belarus, Thailand, France, Mozambique, Ethiopia, Spain, Algeria, Turkey, Mexico, Indonesia, the Dominican Republic, Saudi Arabia, Nepal, Vietnam, Senegal, and Colombia. The staff provided tours of the library and library cards for students from the Immigrant Learning Center and the Malden High School ESL classes.
