A motion was made by Councillor O'Malley, seconded by Councillor at Large Colon Hayes, that the Order be recommended favorably to the City Council. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Chair McDonald opened the meeting with a reading of Papers 174 and 175-23 then allowed CFO Ranaghan to explain his presentation on road work reconstruction, which is attached to the history of both papers. He explained that some of these streets would be started this fall while others that need lead line, water main, gas line replacement will be put off until next construction season. Project will take two years to complete. The intent of these two papers being introduced simultaneously is so that the project may begin with the free cash and then the bonding can go out in the new fiscal year for the second half of the job but it's important to secure a vote by the Council for the entirety of amount needed.

Councillor Simonelli reported that the meetings on this project he has attended in the Mayor's Office have been very informative and well organized. He praised the team for all the hard work they are doing to make sure that no street gets overlooked.

Councillor Colon-Hayes asked how the streets are chosen for repaving. Engineer Yem Lip reported he meets with representatives from National Grid twice a month in an effort to coordinate the city's list of streets needing reconstruction with their list of streets needing underground work. Streets are based on need and if any work needs to be done to water/gas lines prior to paving. A new road will typically last 4-5 years before cracks start to show but preventative maintenance can be done with crack seal to extend the life.

Councillor Winslow asked about water/sewer lines and storm drains and if that was factored into this budget request. This \$6m is money that is earmarked for paving, there is a Water Sewer Enterprise Fund that is used to replace water mains. Full depth reconstructions with sidewalk panels and the such cannot get paid for through the Water Sewer Enterprise Fund.

Councillor O'Malley asked for confirmation that we are not paving streets over old gas mains. CFO Ranaghan confirmed that every year, prior to starting a paving project like this, the city provides National Grid with a list of all the streets they intend to pave and N.G. investigates the list to make sure there are no mains that need replacing. If there are streets of concern to either party, that street is waitlisted. For this reason, publicly announcing a list of streets that are due for reconstruction is not advisable because the list is fluid and may very well change. Despite hearing this, some of the Councillors in attendance requested a draft list of planned streets.

Councillor Murphy and Winslow agreed that maintenance for roads is important to keep them in good condition. Murphy asked the team if they would consider long term planning and costs moving forward on what the city should be spending on seal coating and maintenance that would increase the longevity.

Councillor Linehan reported OSPCD has one project in the pipeline they are hoping this money may aid in, an affordable housing development.

Councillor O'Malley questioned a policy wherein the CPC law allows the city to funnel money above the levy into the CPC and then become eligible for a match, much like the way a 401(k) works. It was then mentioned that there are only five cities that were voted into this, making this program rare but it is something worth looking into for future benefit.

A motion was made by Councillor Linehan, seconded by Councillor at Large Colon Hayes, that the Order be recommended favorably to the City Council. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.
